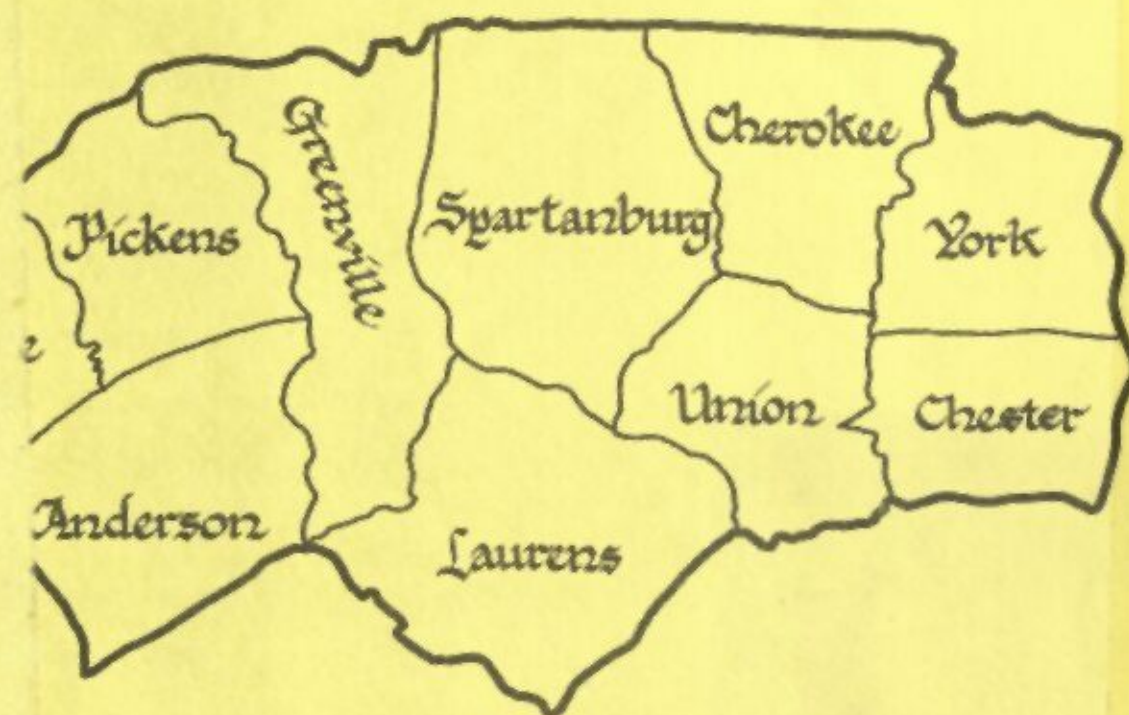

LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS

The following is part of a preliminary inventory of original copies of Spartanburg County newspapers that the Society has purchased. In addition to the volumes listed below, this collection includes newspapers thought previously to have been lost in the 1917 fire of the Herald-Journal building. These include issues of the Carolina Spartan and Spartanburg Journal dating between 1898 and 1902. (The microfilm copy of these papers have a gap which runs from 1893 to 1904.) Files for the Piedmont Headlight for 1897 and 1898 are also included in this collection. (The W.P.A. History of Spartanburg states that no files are available for this paper.) There are various issues of the Herald dating from 1900. Also present are the November 15, 1855 Greenville Mountaineer and the July 17, 1844 Carolina Spartan. While none of the above files are complete, they are certainly a welcome addition to the resources on Spartanburg County.

Many are in a poor state of preservation, but the recent announcement of the South Carolina Newspaper Project will give us a chance to perhaps have them microfilmed.

The following are some of the bound volumes of newspapers we have acquired. Only a few are listed here. We have a total of over 50 volumes.

CAPTAIN WM. NATHANIEL AUSTIN, SR. OF "GILDER" PLANTATION
(Gilder's Creek, now Greenville County, South Carolina)

By written tradition in the author's family, several brothers and a sister came directly from England to America. They settled in Virginia. In 1763, Captain Austin appears to have migrated from Lunenburg County, Virginia into Orange County, North Carolina. By 1770 he had made his way into Laurens County, South Carolina. While we can assume he was a descendant of William Austin of Southside Virginia, no positive proof has been found up to this writing. Unfortunately, Austins liked the same names which makes them difficult to trace.

Part of a letter referring to Captain Nathaniel Austin written by his grandson Dr. William Lawrence Manning Austin of third GILDER to his nephew who was a Methodist minister in Georgia has been photocopied and certified by Colonel James Manning Austin who resides in Riverside, California. The pertinent part of this letter follows:

SKETCH BOOK

GILDER, S.C. Feb. 15th 1855

Dear Nephew

I was much gratified by receiving your last mail...and hope you will continue regularly as it affords me great pleasure to receive an epistle from you. In response to your interigation...my father [William Austin, Jr. of GILDER] was born in Lunenburg, Virginia [on 27th March 1759 according to the Gilder Bible]. My Grandfather, Nathaniel Austin, together with one of his brothers Wm. Austin, came to S.C. some time prior to the Revolution. [He] settled in Newberry District then in Laurens and from thence to Greenville where he lived during the war. He had ten sons and one daughter. The daughter [Mary] Polly was killed by the Indians in the Indian war that preceded the Revolution. His sons [not in proper order by ages] were called THOMPSON, WILLIAM, JOHN, THOMAS, ROBERT, DICKERSON, FRANCIS, WALTER, SAMUEL AND NATHANIEL. Robert only is alive so far as I know. He is living in North Carolina. [Correct order by ages: Nathan, Jr. 1743, Walter Manning 1745, Thomas 1747, John Edd 1754, Francis 1753, Dickerson 1755, William 1759 Va., Thompson 1761 Va., Mary Va. or N.C. 1764, Samuel 1774 S.C., and Robert 1776 S.C.]

My mother [Jane Collins] I think was born in Pennsylvania. At any rate her brother Thomas Collins came to S.C. from that State prior to the Revolution.... [Jane's father John also came to South Carolina.]

(SIGNED) WILLIAM LAWRENCE MANNING AUSTIN

(Note: William Lawrence Manning Austin was a medical doctor who lived at Gilder III.)

During the war years Captain Nathaniel Austin was probably a squatter on Gilder land as his daughter Mary was killed there and her grave is in the family graveyard with her parents, on a hill overlooking Gilder's Creek. Descendants have built a brick wall around the graves with an iron gate bearing the name AUSTIN. Captain Nathaniel Austin, Sr.'s grave has been properly marked as a Revolutionary War soldier. A marker bearing the names of the ten sons was erected at the site of Gilder II, the Captain's second home. Deer drink quietly and seemingly unafraid in Gilder's Creek not far away.

South Carolina

George the Third by the Grace of God, of Great-Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith and so forth, To All To Whom These Presents shall come Greeting: Know Ye, That We of our special Grace, certain Knowledge and mere Motion, have given and granted, and by these Presents, for us our heir and successors, Do Give And Grant unto Nathan Austin his heirs and assigns, a plantation or tract of land containing one hundred acres situate in Berkley County on a Branch of Saludy called Little River Branch three feet in width and six inches depth of water bounding to the north on Land of W^m Linn to the South on Land of John Linn all other sides on vacant Land And hath such shape, form and marks, as appear by a plat thereof, hereunto annexed: Together with all woods, under-woods, timber and timber-trees, lakes, ponds, sishings, waters, water-courses, profits, commodities, appurtenances and hereditaments whatsoever, thereunto belonging or in anywise appertaining: Together with privilege of hunting, hawking and fowling in and upon the same, and all mines and minerals whatsoever; saving and referring, nevertheless, to us, our heirs and successors, all white pine-trees, if any there should be found growing thereon; and also saving and reserving, nevertheless, to us, our heirs and successors, one-tenth part of mines of gold and silver only: To Have And To Hold, the said tract of one hundred acres of land and all and singular other the premises hereby granted unto the said Nathan Austin his heirs and assigns for ever, in free and common soccage, the said Nathan Austin his heirs and assigns yielding and paying therefor unto us, our heirs and successors; or to Receiver-General for the time being, or to his Deputy or Deputies for the time being, yearly, that is to say, on the twenty-fifth day of March, in every year at the rate of three shillings sterling, or four shillings proclamation money, for every hundred acres, and so in proportion, according to the number of acres, contained herein; the same to commence at the expiration of two years from the date hereof, Provided always, and this present Grant is upon condition, nevertheless, that the said Nathan Austin his heirs or assigns, shall and do, yearly, and every year, and after the of these presents, clear and cultivate at the rate of

three acres for every hundred acres of land, and so in proportion according to the number of acres herein contained; And Also shall and do enter a minute or docket of these our letters patent in the office of our Auditor-General for the time being, in our said Province, within Six months from the date hereof; And upon condition, that if the said rent, hereby reserved, shall happen to be in arrear and unpaid for the space of three years from the time it shall become due, and no distress can be found on the said lands, tenements and hereditaments hereby granted; or if the said Nathan Austin, his heirs or assigns shall neglect to clear and cultivate yearly and every year, at the rate of three acres for every hundred acres of land, and so in proportion, according to the number of acres herein contained, or if a minute or docket of these our letters patent, shall not be entered in the office of our Auditor-General for the time being, in our said Province, within Six months from the date hereof, that then and in any of these cases, this present Grant shall cease, and determine and be utterly void; and the said lands, tenements and hereditaments hereby granted, and every part and parcel thereof, shall revert to us, our heirs and successors, as fully and absolutely, as if the same had never been granted.

Captain Nathaniel Austin
in the Revolution

There are eight Indents in the Archives of the South Carolina Historical Commission at Columbia relating to Captian Nathaniel Austin's Revolutionary War service. He served in General Andrew Pickens's Brigade, South Carolina Militia. He fought with General Pickens at the seige of Charleston, Musgrove Mill, Cowpens, Augusta and Kettle Creek in Georgia. His original Indent reads as follows:

South Carolina.

Pursuant to an Act of the General Assembly passed the 16th of March, 1782, We, the Commissioners of the Treasury, have this Day delivered to Mr. Nathaniel Austin this our Indented Certificate, for the Sum of Ninety-two Pounds, Nine Shillings and ten Pence

Sterling for Duty done in the Militia as Captain and Provisions for State Troops and Militia in 1779 and 1781 as per amount passed by the Commissioners on Accounts, the said Nathaniel Austin, his Executors, Administrators, or assigns, will be entitled to receive from this Office the sum of Six Pounds Nine Shillings and five Pence on the Demand for one Year's Interest on the principal Sum of Ninety-two Pounds Nine Shillings and Ten Pence and the like Interest annually. The said Nathaniel Austin his Executors, Administrators or Assigns, will be entitled also to receive and shall be paid if demanded, the principal Sum of Ninety-two Pounds Nine Shillings and ten Pence on the eighth of August, 1787. And the said Nathaniel Austin, his Executors, Administrators or Assigns may make any purchases at any Public Sales of Confiscated Property (except such as shall be ordered by the Legislature for Special Purposes;) and this Indent shall be received in Payment.

For the true Performance of the several Payments in Manner above-mentioned, the Public Treasury is made liable, and the Faith of the State pledged by the aforesaid Act.

Given under our hands at the Treasury-Office, in Charleston, the eighth day of August, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-five.

Grant to Nathaniel Austin

"The State of South Carolina.
TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME. GREETING.

Know Ye, That in pursuance of an Act of the Legislature, entitled "An Act for establishing the mode of granting the lands now vacant in this State, and for allowing a commutation to be received for some lands that have been granted," passed the 19th day of February, 1791:

We have Granted, and by these presents do grant unto Nathaniel Austin, Senior, his heirs and assigns, a plantation or tract of land containing

Five Hundred acres surveyed for him the 23rd day of January 1796 situate in Ninety Six District on both sides of the dividing line of Laurens and Greenville Counties on the North fork of Durbin's Creek waters of Enoree River bounded by lines running N.E. by Richard Jones, Joshua Fowler, Stephen Marchbanks and William Collins' Land, N.W. by William Austin, Cap Jonathan Davis and Thomas Nick's, S.E. Nicholas Whites and William Jones's.

having such shape, form and marks as are here represented by a plat hereto annexed, together with all woods, trees, waters, watercourses, profits, commodities, appurtenances and hereditaments

whatsoever thereunto belonging, TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said tract of Five Hundred acres of land, and all and singular other the premises hereby granted unto the said Nathaniel Austin Senior, his heirs and assigns forever, in free and common socage.
GIVEN UNDER THE SEAL OF THE STATE.

Witness his Excellency Charles Pinckney Esquire, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the said State, at Columbia this sixth day of March Anno Domini one thousand seven hundred and ninety seven in the twenty-first year of the Independence of the United States of America.

SOME OF THE FOREFATHERS OF ANDERSON COUNTY
(continued from Vol. I, No. 4, p. 160)

One of the very first families in the town was that of Robert Wilson. He was the son of William Wilson and his wife, who had been Jane Cunningham. She died in Anderson at the home of one of her children in 1834. Robert had a brother named William, Robert's wife was named Sarah Norton.

The family consisted of three sons and two daughters, all members of Anderson's first "younger set." One son, Joseph, went to Alabama soon after he grew up, and from a few letters written to him by members of the family in Anderson, which have miraculously escaped destruction, brief glimpses may be caught of that far away Anderson; also by reading those simple family letters written when railroad trains and mail service were few and poor, one can understand how near kindred came to lose each other so completely as many of them did long ago.

When Joseph went away, it was merely an experiment. He was trying the western country. His brother, Jephtha, made him a visit, and in a letter written to Joseph soon after his return to Anderson Jephtha tells him that he told their parents that he thought the reason Joseph did not return with him was that he was going to be married out there. Then there are letters from the mother telling the absent boy that she misses him, and hopes he will soon make them a visit. If he gets married he must be sure to bring his wife to see the home people. In one of her letters to her son, Sarah Wilson tells him of the marriages of a number of his young friends, and as those couples became ancestors of many Anderson people of the present time, the old news is still interesting. Berry Lewis has married Matilda Poole, Gillison Harris weds Matilda Smith, Thomas George marries Matilda Wilson--Matilda seems to have been a popular name--Haynes Whitaker to Maria Drennan, Robert Whitaker to a Georgia lady whose name Mrs. Wilson does not seem to know, Peter Byrum and Mary Ann Drenna, William Archer to Harriet Norris, James McDonald to Elvira Pickens, Baker Gentry to Betsy Moorhead, James Gordon to Miss--(that name is undecipherable), Jesse Smith to Betsey Clark. Since those young couples were married three generations of their descendants have grown up, their grandchildren are the grandparents of the present young people.

In 1837 Jephtha Wilson writes his brother "I now take the opportunity to inform you that I got home safely, and came in six days and a half." He does not mention the means of transportation. Further he says, "I do want you to come home, for we are in high prosperity. There is more money in the county than I ever saw, every one is able to pay his debts, except those who do not want to do so."

A sister of Jephtha Wilson, named Elizabeth, married first a Mr. Overby. Little is said of him, or of the marriage. The indications are, however, that it was not a happy one, and Mr. Overby seems to have left the country without taking his wife with him. Later he seems to have died and Elizabeth marries Mr. Jackson.

The first letter of the series was written by the mother in 1834. She tells Joseph that his grandmother and grandfather Wilson have died. She says: "Your sister is going to be married December 11th,

and we want you to come home at that time, if you can." That sister was Elvira, who married Marshall Stensel. In several subsequent letters both Elvira and Marshall are mentioned, and several times their children are written about as being fine interesting little people. The most of the letters are written by Jephtha, though there are several from the mother, who always urges the faraway son to come home on a visit. In one written many years after the first, she says: "If you could come to see us just once I would try to be satisfied." Both the mother and the sister Elizabeth ask the number of Joseph's children and their names. Joseph seems never to have returned, and the family left at home never saw his wife nor any of his children.

The youngest member of the Wilson family was a boy called Tandy, who was a little fellow when his brother Joseph went away, and his brother Jephtha was almost like a father to him. A spoiled youngster he must have been, the pet and pride of all of the older brothers and sisters, as well as the Benjamin of his parents. In some of the earlier letters Jephtha tells Joseph: "Tandy is eighteen years old, and nearly as large as I am, and as lazy as ever." Again he says: "Tandy is a good workman when you can get him down to it, but he likes better to frolic." Again: "Tandy has been laid up, and has done nothing for four months, with something like white swelling in his shoulder. He is on the mend now. He is as large as I am and a tolerable good workman." Another time he says that he sent Tandy to school in Pendleton, but that he would rather dance than study. Then after a long while comes another letter in which Jephtha says: "For fear you did not get a letter concerning the death of our brother, Tandy W. Wilson, which I wrote you last summer I will state the facts again: Tandy volunteered in the company of volunteers that went to Mexico. After they had been there some time, they went out of the city to take up the body of Colonel Butler of their regiment. On returning to the city, three young men from Charleston got behind the main body and were killed by guerrillas. When the roll was called on the return of the regiment to the city, Tandy and the others were missing. The company of cavalry that belonged to the regiment was ordered out to search for them, and found (sic) [found?] them near the road, shot, and their throats cut. They were buried with the honors of war where their bodies were found. This is all I could ever learn about Tandy."

In one letter the mother says: "Elvira thinks hard of you, that you never write to her, for she thinks more of you than any of her brothers. I have a good many things to talk to you about, and tell you about my troubles in this world. I cannot express my feelings at this time, for I write with tears in my eyes. I never expected to see you again unless you think enough of me to come to see me. I have a great desire to see your wife and children. If you would only come to see me one time I would try to be satisfied."

Joseph seems to have a tenderness in his heart for Elvira, for the mother says in one letter: "Elvira wants you to bring her name-sake to see her."

It was not only real distance that separated families in those hard days; members of the clan living much closer together saw each other at long intervals. In one letter to Joseph the mother, in telling about the family, says: "I have not seen your sister Elizabeth in about five years; she never comes to see me, but the

children come sometime." At that time the Wilson family seems to have been living in Due West, where they spent several years, and Mrs. Wilson, in writing of her home and her neighbors, unconsciously gives a good idea of herself. She says: "We live in a very religious place. The neighbors are friendly and kind, they are like sisters and mothers to me. Let me go where I will, I find friends." In telling about the family the mother writes: "Your grandmother Norton is still living at the old place. Your uncle Robert Emberson is living with her (married her daughter). Your aunt Betsy Wilkerson lives on the same plantation."

In 1862 Jephtha writes: "I have not heard from you in three years until this spring. I met with a man in Charleston that said he lived in the adjoining county. He told me you were still living. Uncle Jep still lives in Greenville (Jephtha Norton); his son William lives in this place, and is getting rich carrying on a merchant tailor business." The old Grandmother Norton was still living with her daughter and son-in-law. "Sister Elizabeth and Bill Jackson live where the old Mt. Tabor church road turns out of the General's Road. M.M. Stansel and Elvira live in a mile and a half of this place. They have four boys and two girls." They seem to have moved later to Calhoun.

The last letter is written in 1862. Jephtha says that his father died at his home December 21, 1861, in his eighty-third year. Their mother had gone to live with Elvira at Calhoun. He says further: "I have rented a farm from one of my brothers-in-law in the army, that is, my wife's brothers. There is not a single man in this country who is thought anything of who is not in the army."

The war ended the letters. Joseph seems to have treasured these missives from his old home, and as age increased their interest, his descendants in Alabama still preserve them. They are few, but extend over a period of twenty-eight years. They present a simple picture of life as Anderson people were living it in those days.

Mr. Jephtha Wilson lived to be the oldest man in Anderson, and the one who had resided in the place the longest time. His memory was always good, and it is to incidents related by him to younger people and remembered by them that much of Anderson's early history has been preserved.

One of the oldest and most numerous families in the county is that of Burriss, spelled in several different ways, but all of the same blood. The first of the name to come to Anderson county was Joshua, born in Virginia in 1724. He moved to South Carolina in 1776. His wife was Sarah Chamblee, and they lived not far from where Gluck Mill is now located. They were the parents of seven children, all of whom settled on land given them by their father on Generostee Creek. The names of Joshua Burriss' children with the names of the men and women they married are: Elisha married Margaret Greelee; Elizabeth, born 1768, married Asa Castleberry in 1796; James, born 1776, married Susan Cain in 1794; John, born 1776, married Elizabeth Davis in 1796; Mary, born 1778, married Lewis Chamblee in 1798; Thomas, born 1782, married Jane Davis in 1800; Nancy, born 1794, married Silas Massey in 1812. All of these couples left descendants who have intermarried with most of the old families of the community. Many of them have moved away, and in 1906 records had been collected of living people at that time of 1,313 descendants

of the original Burriss family; they were then scattered over eleven states, and the work had only begun. Since that year much has been added to the family history.

Joshua Burriss became a man of wealth. On his arrival in what is now Anderson County, he bought land from James McCarley, and the deed bears the date October 4th, 1795. At one time Joshua Burriss owned as much land as constitutes a township now. His possessions embrace parts of what is now Centerville, Rock Mills, Savannah and Varennes townships. In settling his sons, Mr. Burriss had a method all his own. He placed them up and down Generostee Creek according to their ages. Elisha, the oldest, was placed farthest north, on what was long known as the "Old Byrum Place," now the Anderson Country Club. The next was James, whose home stood near where the Orr Mill is now. He and his wife are buried in the old Mt. Tabor grave yard. John's land was about where the "Old Watson home" is now, the place which belonged to the late Manley Watson. Thomas's land was near Old Rock Mills, and his is buried in an ancient grave yard at that place. His daughters were differently placed. One of them, Mary Chamblee, owned the old Whitner place, which Judge Whitner bought from Moses Chamblee, probably her son.

The original Burriss in this community spelled his name Boroughs, but his sons spelled it Burriss, and in the next generation there were three brothers who spelled it in three different ways. Burriss has, however, come to be the general way of writing the name.

The Burriss family soon began to own slaves as well as real estate. Among those belonging to Mr. Jacob Burriss was a native African who always insisted upon using a rock for a pillow.

Among the many who have borne the name, William Burriss standshigh. He was a son of the pioneer Baptist preacher, Jacob Burriss, who must have been a grandson of the original Joshua. Modest, quiet, unassuming, he yet rose to a prominent and dignified position solely by his sterling character. In a eulogy of him at the time of his death, the late W.W. Keys, editor of The Baptist Courier, whose wife was a relative of Mr. Burriss, said of him in the words of Byron: "Though modest, on his unembarrassed brow nature had written gentleness." His home was not on the public road; it stood about half a mile back on the farm, shut from view by woods sequestered and quiet, a stately building surrounded by luxuriant vegetation, and a plantation well managed and thoroughly worked.

Mr. Burriss married Sarah Moorhead. His family were loyal and prominent members of Salem Church for many years. Mr. Burriss served that church as deacon and treasurer for an ordinary lifetime.

While William Burriss attended strictly to his own affairs, he was not indifferent to the just demands of his community. Always ready to cooperate in any enterprise that was for the public good. He never sought office of any kind, but was well informed on public affairs. A fine type of citizen, and one who has left an impression on the community in which he passed his life.

Three of his sons became citizens of the town of Anderson, and each showed many of his father's characteristics--gentleness, modesty and kindness being very pronounced in all of them. They were the three brothers, all dead now--Marcus, Rufus and Boyce Burriss.

HENRY HOUSER HOUSE

Henry Houser, born 1756, died 4 March 1822, York District, S.C. was a stone mason by trade and built the Henry Houser house between 1797 and 1803. He and his wife (Jane Howser ~~Shovell~~) lived there until his death in 1822. A sign over the door reads "Henry Houser - Stone Mason, Jane Howser - 1803." *SHE WAS A HEFNER*

Henry Houser's house and land are now in the Kings Mountain National Military Park, Cowpens Battlefield. The house is located 1 1/4 miles east of the Visitor Center, and 1/4 mile east of County Road S-11-86. The National Government restored the house in 1974 at the cost of \$64,000 and had data researched by E.C. Bears, et al, on history of family and house.

For further information on the house, write Box 31, Kings Mountain, NC 28060. They can tell you whether or not the house is open to visitors, the hours, etc. should you be passing that way while traveling on your vacation.

THE FAMILY OF WILLIAM AND MARY ALLEN MILLWOOD

Editor's Note: The Pacolet Neigh was published for the Pacolet Mills community beginning around 1949. It was published as late as January 1955 (Vol. VI, No.7).

One of the most interesting families of our community was the family of William and Mary Allen Millwood.

Mr. Millwood, when he went into service in the Civil War, had two sons, Henry and Dixie. While in service he had one knee cap shot off and had a stiff knee as a result.

The family lived in the old home on the site where Mr. W.O. Holmes now lives, and Mr. Millwood dug ditches for a Mr. Norman near Foster's Mill for 25 cents a day to help care for his family.

There were eighteen children born of this union, and seventeen of them grew to maturity.

Eventually Mr. Millwood accumulated 347 acres of land in two tracts. There was 247 acres in the home place and 100 in the Gore Community. We asked Mr. Clarence (Bub) Millwood how they ever raised such a family and he told me his father was a very mild man but was very strict about the children working. He said his father took them out to the field with a lantern and sat on a stump until it was light enough to see, then they all got busy. They took an hour for dinner and started home when the mother blew the bugle, which was like a large tin horn. They always stopped work at sundown. He said the mother never worked in the field after the children got big enough to work, and "I really don't see how she could with the ever increasing and growing family."

Mr. Clarence Millwood was next to the youngest child. Milton was the baby and, so Bub says, spoiled to death by the parents. He said Milton never would work on the farm. We remember Milton's family when they lived at Pacolet Mills.

He said they had a Millwood reunion in 1911 and he never saw so many Millwoods all at one time. As the children grew up and married they either helped farm the place or live on tenant farms.

He said the boys were all good looking rascals, or at least the girls all thought so.

Bud(sic.) says the only time in his life his father ever whipped him was for stealing tobacco. He said they didn't care much about chewing but liked to spit the juice on lizard's heads to see them jump. He relates the whole family of children felt so bad about the whipping they couldn't eat supper, and it was like a funeral.

The mother was the disciplinarian of the family and when she said move, they all put on speed. She used to carry a switch in her apron band for speedy punishment.

The mother raised geese and as the daughters got married she

made each of them a goose feather mattress, and gave them either \$25.00 or a cow, whichever they chose, and when the boys got married father gave each son \$75.00 or a horse.

The family burying ground was at Gore's Church, now known as Bethesda. Mrs. Millwood died in 1916 and Mr. Millwood in 1919. Now living, among the children, are Mrs. Sallie Higgins, Greenville; Mrs. Jeanie Millwood, Pacolet; Mr. Clarence Millwood, Pacolet, and Mr. Boyd Millwood, Spartanburg.

At the time of Mr. Millwood's death the farms were divided and each child received from 18 to 24 acres of land. Descendants still living on inherited land are: Mrs. Louis Burgess, granddaughter, and Mrs. Fannie Harvey, granddaughter. A number of grandchildren and great grandchildren are working at Pacolet Mills now.

Mr. Bud Millwood, the youngest living child is now 69 years old and is well and strong.

There are many interesting stories about this fine family, and perhaps sometime we may be able to tell more about them.

BOOK REVIEWS

My High Line. Compiled by Joseph and Jessye High. This book can be purchased from Mr. and Mrs. High by writing them at 411 Forest Dr., Mtn. Home, AR 72653. Hardcover, 269 pages including index, \$30.00

My High Line is one of the best genealogies to have come across the editor's desk recently. It is well written and researched and contains much more than endless lists of generations.

This particular High line descends from John High who was born in England around 1599. He left there in October 1635 and settled first in the West Indies and later in Charles City County, Va. His son, Thomas High (1647-1687) died leaving land in Southwark Parish, Surry County, Virginia. (One of the few weaknesses of this book is that the only source given as proof of Thomas High's parentage is The Compendium of American Genealogy which was published about 250 years after Thomas' birth and must therefore be considered a secondary source. However, this must be expected since VA has been one of the major battlegrounds of American history and many records have been lost due to this fact. Incidentally, this is the only weak link in this High chain.) Thomas' great-grandson, Benjamin William High, and all but one of his 12 children moved to Spartanburg Co. around 1807. From thence, his descendants have moved to all parts of the country including AL, AR, GA, ILL & MI.

Other Spartanburg County families presented in detail include the Amos, Bomar, Cantrell, Foster, Gramling, Martin, Turner and Wingo families.

Confederate Veterans Enrollment Book of York County, SC-1902. By Jo Roberts Owens and Ruth Dickson Thomas. This book can be purchased from Mrs. Owens, 10 Lynnwood Cir., York, SC 29745. Soft cover, 151 pages, indexed, \$13.50

This book provides a complete transcript of the York County Enrollment Book. Enrollment books were kept by each county to complete this state's incomplete Civil War service records. This volume not only lists the York County veterans living when this record was made in 1902 but also those who had died in the war and afterwards. The veterans are grouped according to townships which helps one have a more precise idea of where in the county a soldier lived. Undoubtedly, this volume contains information which is not found elsewhere. Mrs. Owens and Mrs. Thomas are to be commended on an excellent job and for making us aware of this little known source. Well done!
