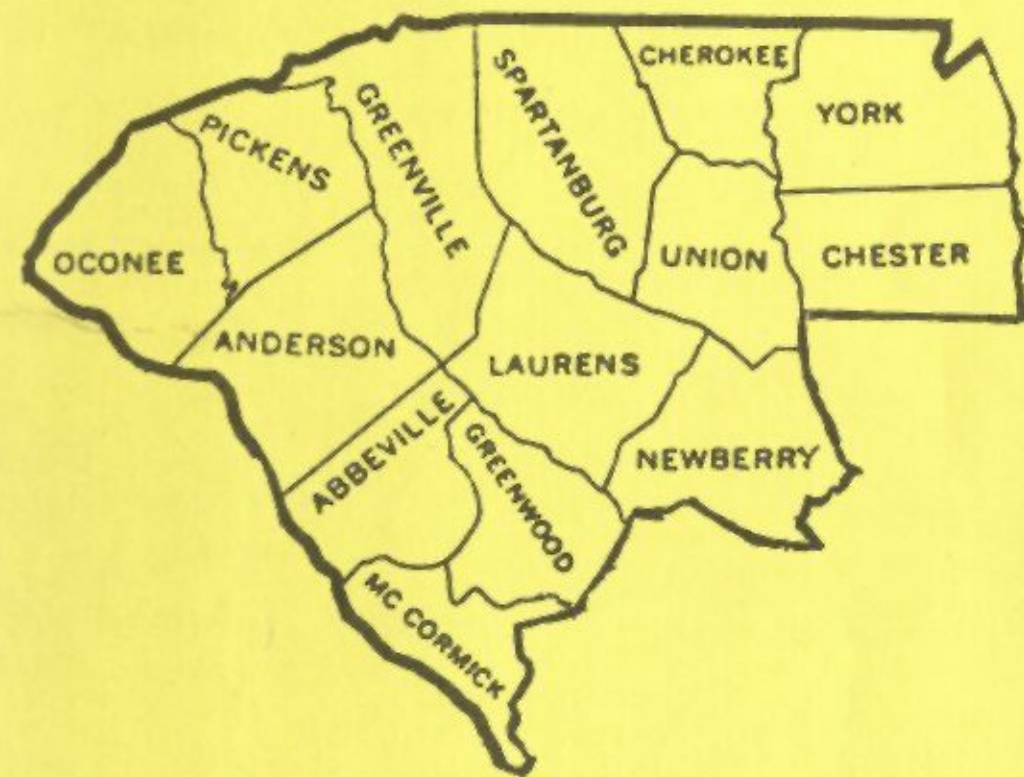

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BOOK REVIEWS

Greer and Related Families of the Carolinas and Virginia by Brent Holcomb. Order from the author at PO Box 21766, Columbia, SC 29221. Hard bound, 109 pages, which includes a full name index, illustrated. \$21.50, including postage and handling.

Once again Mr. Holcomb has compiled an enjoyable and informative family history. As with his history of the Humphries and Betenbaugh families, this book also concentrates on Union County, S.C. Mr. Holcomb traces this family back to Thomas Greer, who was born in Ireland circa 1710, and who was the first in this line to immigrate to this county in the 1740's. Other surnames mentioned include: Sanders, Sims, Glenn, Christmas, Smith, Ferris and Carver. Also included is a verbatim copy of a letter describing the family history of J.W. Cooper which was written to his son in 1856.

The format used in this book easily allows the reader to follow the descendants from the first generation down to the ninth, and is well documented throughout. This book is a must for anyone with a Greer connection.

CHESTER COUNTY DEED BOOK C

Pp. 32-35. Hugh Knox, Sheriff of Chester County, to William Robertson, planter. £16 sterling for 200 acres on Reedy Fork, waters of Sandy River, formerly the property of Joshua Repault. Part of 600 acres originally granted to Richard Warring on December 23, 1771. Richard Warring conveyed the above mentioned 200 acres to David Pruit, who conveyed it to Owin Evans, who conveyed it to Joshua Repault. Bounded by the lands of: David Pruit, Benjamin Carter, Edmund Russel, William Boyd. 9 November 1792. Wit. William Morrow, Hugh Stewart, David Boyd

Pp. 35-38. John Frankling and Mourning his wife to Jonathan Dungan. £50 sterling for 18 acres on Flemthens Creek. Part of a 200 acre grant to Thomas Frankling dec'd in December 1772. Bounded by the lands of: William Trussel, Robert Kenedy, Thomas B. Frankling. 23 February 1793. Wit. William Boyd, Jacob Dungan, James Kenedy.

Pp. 38-40. Thomas Baker Frankling and Ann his wife to Jonathan Dungan. £30 for 77 acres on Flemthens Creek, waters of Sandy River, it being part of two tracts-(1) part of 100 acres granted to Major Grisson on October 2, 1786, and later conveyed to Thomas Baker Frankling; (2) part of a 363 acre grant of February 5, 1786. 23 February 1793. Wit. John Frankling, James Kenedy, Jacob Dungan.

Pp. 40-43. Andrew Stevanson and Elizabeth his wife to John Simonton of York County. £100 sterling for 253 acres on the waters of Rocky Creek, being part of three tracts-(1) part of 103 acres granted to Andrew Stevanson on April 22, 1790; (2) part of 50 acres granted to John Carson November 22, 1784 and conveyed by lease and release April 16, 1788 to Andrew Stevanson; (3) part of 100 acres granted to John Carson May 13, 1768 and conveyed to Andrew Stevanson on September 7, 1787. Bounded by the lands of: Mary Harberson, Dougall Balentine, John Cooper, Benjamin Mitchell, Ann Harberson. 8 November 1792. Wit. William Boyd, Robert Harberson, William McCulloch.

Pp. 44-46. Thomas B. Frankling, planter to John Frankling. £40 sterling for 45 acres on Flemthens Creek, a branch of Sandy River, being part of 265 acres granted to Major Winn on March 6, 1789. 13 March 1792. Wit. Allen DeGraffinreid, William Wood, Philip Knowling, James Stewart.

Pp. 46-49. Ephraim Frankling to Thomas B. Frankling. £10 sterling for 128 acres on the waters of Sandy River. Granted to Ephraim Frankling in 1792. Bounded by the lands of: Richard Taliaferro, Thomas Roden. 22 January 1793. Wit. (Pak?) McGrey, Wm Amour, Dan'l Trussel.

Pp. 49-51. Thomas Baker Frankling, planter to John Frankling.

£100 sterling for 202 acres on Flemthens Creek, a branch of Sandy River, being part of four grants and one tract--(1) part of 100 acres granted to Thomas Frankling on November 24, 1767; (2) part of 100 acres granted to Thomas B. Frankling on October 2, 1786; (3) part of 363 acres granted to Major Grisson on February 5, 1787; (4) part of 50 acres granted to Major Grisson on August 7, 1786; (5) 50 acre tract. 13 March 1792. Wit. Allen Degraffenreid, William Wood, Philip Noland, James Stewart.

Pp. 52-54. James Hughey and Sarah his wife to John Frankling. £100 sterling for 50 acres on Flemthens Creek, part of 100 acres granted to Edward Flemthens on June 3, 1766. Bounded by the lands of: John Hopkins, Thomas Franklin. 20 August 1792. Wit. John Kenedy, Thomas B. Franklin, John Weir. Sarah Hughey released her dower rights on ____ day of ____ 1792.

Pp. 54-58. Hugh Knox, Sheriff of Chester County to John Frankling, planter. £42 sterling for 297 acres, formerly belonging to Thomas B. Frankling and Nolley Cates, being part of several tracts--(1) part of 265 acres granted to Minor Winn March 6, 1787; (2) part of a 200 acres tract; (3) part of a 50 acres tract; (4) part of 100 acres granted to Thomas B. Frankling November 24, 1767; (5) part of 100 acres granted to Thomas B. Frankling on October 2, 1786; (6) part of 50 acres granted to Major Grisson on August 7, 1786. 25 March 1793. Wit. D. Sims, Sam'l Lacey.

Pp. 58-60. James Hughey, planter to James Stewart. £50 sterling for 50 acres on Stony Fork, waters of Sandy River, part of 200 acres granted to Edward Wilson. 20 March 1790. Wit. Thomas Jinkins, James Gore, James Hardwick.

Pp. 60-61. Robert Fullwood of Clarendon County sold to Thomas Gather a "negral fellow named Peter, formerly the property of Moses Brown." 3 March 1793. Wit. Thomas Jinkins.

Pp. 61-62. Charles Fincklen of Prince Fredricks parish Liber[ty] County, planter to John Head, planter. £40 sterling for a negroe girl named Jemimah. 24 December 1792. Wit. Thomas Fincklen, George Head.

Pp. 62-63. Archibald Elliott, Junior to David Davis, planter. £14 sterling for 52 acres and 3 rods on the waters of Fishing Creek, part of a tract conveyed from Archibald Elliott, Sr. to Archibald Elliott, Jr. in 1792. Bounded by the lands of: Robert Gill. 24 June 1793. Wit. William Spaw, James Barron, Elijah Davis.

Pp. 63-65. William Stone and Elizabeth his wife to Dennis Carell. £100 sterling for 108 acres on a branch of Sandy River, part of 300 acres granted to William Stone on June 17, 1760. "Transferred from John Stone, Moses Stone and Jacob Stone unto Dennis Carrell and William Stone the 19th day of October 1783." 23 March 1791. Wit. Robert Lemonds, James Head, Henry Head.

Pp. 65-67. John Gore and Mary his wife to Nathan Coffey. £100 sterling for 126 acres on Sandy River. Granted to Zachariah Isbell on October 15, 1762. Conveyed to James Gore, dec'd and by will bequeathed to John Gore. Bounded by the lands of: James Timms, Sampson Nolan, David Boyd. 7 January 1793. Wit. William Boyd, Major Grission, Philip Noland.

Pp. 67-69. Thomas Fletchall and Francis Rogers to Allen DeGraffenreid. £65 sterling for 85 acres on the waters of Sandy River. Granted to Thomas Fletchall October 5, 1758. Bounded by the lands of: Sam'l Wells, Joseph Davis, Thomas Jinkins. 17 April 1793. Wit. Hollis Timms, Thomas States White, Jeremiah Thomas.

Pp. 70-71. Dennis Carrell and Sarah his wife to William Stone. £100 sterling for 77 acres on a branch of Sandy River. Part of 300 acres, resurveyed 225 acres, granted to William Stone June 17, 1760. "Transferred from John Stone, Moses Stone, and Jacob Stone to Dennis Carrol and William Stone October 19, 1783." 23 March 1791. Wit. Robert Lemonds, James Head, Henry Head.

Pp. 71-75. John Morris of Craven County Camden District St. Marks Parish, planter and Mary his wife to James Bankhead, planter. £21 8 shillings 6 pence sterling for 200 acres on waters of Rocky Creek. Granted to John Morris June 23, 1774. Bounded by the lands of: John Cooper, Sarah Knox, Patrick McGerity. 18 February 1785. Wit. James McGerity, William McGerity.

Pp. 75-77. William Ford the eldest son of and heir of Thomas Ford, dec'd to James Clark. £26 sterling for 50 acres on Hagues Branch, waters of Rocky Creek, part of 100 acres granted to Thomas Ford October 4, 1768. 12 March 1793. Wit. William Hawkins, Burrell Sandfer.

TRANQUIL METHODIST CHURCH

The following was found in a Bible in the Methodist Historical Collection at Wofford College. The Bible was printed in 1834 by B. Waugh and T. Mason, of New York, for the Methodist Episcopal Church. On the front inside cover is written the following: "This Book belongs at Tranquil Church May 30th 1835. Steal it not for fear of guilt and shame." On the "Family Record", between the Old and New Testament, is written the following:

TRANQUIL CHURCH
Zacheus Wright
Francis A. Shell
Jacob F. Gilliam
Robert G. Gilliam
Lemmon Shell

These names are here inscribed, that those, who in coming time worship at this place, may behold them and may recognize them as the names of those who by their contributions, and by the labours of their hands, being assisted in a small degree by the donations of other's, did cause this edifice to be built and dedicated to the worship of god .

Two of them now (1846) F.A. and L. Shell are removed to the State of Mississippi. One Jacob F. Gilliam sleeps in his Silent grave hard by [i.e. near the church]. Two Z. Wright and R.G. Gilliam still live in this vicinity.

These are men who have made many efforts to perswade men to be good. We hope that those who are permitted to read this short note, may heave one sigh to their memory! may be filled (as to their bosoms) with one deep warm, glowing motion of grattitude to those devout men and that this house, long, after its founders are sleeping in their graves, may continue to be a place of worship for God's people.
